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Course content: It is hard to deny that love takes center stage in the great human drama. This ever-present, gripping, yet elusive force shapes our lives, ourselves, our pursuits, and, of course, our relations with others. Love even finds its way into our anxieties, our delusions, our hopes, and our greatest efforts at self-improvement. This course uncovers a European history about love that continues to shape the present in various ways.

As we follow love on various historical stages – from ancient Greece through the Middle Ages, the romantic era, the post-romantic period, and into the present – we pay close attention to the stories we have told ourselves about love. Our love stories reveal that we conceive of the human condition as desiring, striving, and longing, but also as avoiding reality and the concrete commitments that tie us to finitude. We read responses to this escapism in the form of a moral call to respond to the other, also when this means respecting difference and the other's independence. Throughout, we gain tools for thinking seriously about love today.

Learning Objectives: Together, we will be aiming to: (1) gain an overview of the elaborate discussions on love in the European philosophical and literary traditions; (2) acquire academic skills in navigating and interpreting philosophical works and novels; (3) develop abilities in nuancing and articulating our own views and positions in dialogue with those of others; and (4) relate particular lived experiences of love to universal philosophical concepts that elucidate the human condition.

Language of instruction and discussion: English. (Papers, however, may also be written in Danish, Swedish, Norwegian).

Requirements for DIS-students

For undergraduate students (bachelor students)

Active attendance (at least attendance in 75% of the sessions documented by protocol). DIS must be notified, if you are absent two times or more. The syllabus volume and content are determined by the teacher, and three papers are to be submitted to the teacher of each 9,600-12,000 characters, i.e. 4-5 pages (1.5 line spacing), as well as a final major assignment, which has a size of 19,200-24,000 characters, i.e. 8-10 pages (1.5 line spacing), and based on 400-500 pages of literature. For DIS students, the due date is Thursday, 9 May.

Requirements for KU-students (both Danish students and Exchange students)

For undergraduate students (bachelor students)

Active attendance (at least attendance in 75% of the sessions documented by protocol).

A final major assignment, which has a size of 24.000-28.800 characters, i.e. 10-12 pages (1.5 line spacing), and based on 600-800 pages literature in agreement with the teacher. The teacher must approve the subject and literature. The assignments is assessed by the teacher and a grade is given in accordance with the 7-point grading scale. For KU students, the due date is at Thursday, 30 May, at noon.

For graduate students (kandidat/master students)

Active attendance (at least attendance in 75% of the sessions documented by protocol).

A final paper of 36.000-48-000 characters, i.e. 15-20 pages (1.5 line spacing), and based on 800-1000 pages of literature in agreement with the teacher. The teacher must approve the subject and literature. The assignment is assessed by the teacher, and a grade is given in accordance with the 7-point grading scale. For KU students, the due date is at Thursday, 30 May, at noon.

Discussion board posts: Students are expected to write short posts (no more than ½ page) on the Absalon discussion board. Posts are part of the participation grade and are due before the beginning of each class.

Readings: Completion of reading assignments as scheduled is required and is a prerequisite for participating in class discussions.

Lectures and discussion: In general, class will be a combination of lecture, group work and class discussion. Class participation includes attendance, student presentations, and contributions that students make on discussion posts and in class.

Plagiarism: Any student who plagiarizes will fail the course.
